To help you in cutting down your use of Single Use Plastic containers when you shop why not try refilling your own containers?

An awful lot of single use plastic containers that we use for toiletry products can be replaced by say bars of soap, shampoo, conditioner. And just think how much plastic you can save by refilling your own containers with washing up liquid and other laundry products.

By counting all the plastic you throw away for a week, you can help gather the vital evidence we need to convince UK ministers, supermarkets and big brands to lead the way at global talks that could finally phase out plastic production for good. By the way I think the campaign must mean single use plastics as plastic has valuable uses in many areas, I will check.

How's your Carbon Literacy Knowledge? The Carbon Cost of an Email.

We all need to look at our email useage to reduce carbon emissions in a minor way. For example, according to a study by Carbon Literacy Project, a typical email has a carbon footprint of 4 grams of CO2e, while an email with a large attachment has a carbon footprint of 50 grams of CO2e.

"Berners-Lee estimates that globally emails accounted for *as much as 150m tonnes CO2e in 2019*, or about 0.3% of the world's carbon footprint." (<u>https://carbonliteracy.com</u>) (of course these figures will be much higher now).

Does deleting emails help people reduce their carbon footprint? Yes. In fact, according to The Good Planet, if everyone around the world deleted just 10 emails (spam or not spam), that would save 1,725,000 gigabytes of storage space, which is around 55.2 million kilowatts of power. I am just rushing to my lap top to delete...

There are also a number of things that you can do that not only keep email volumes to a minimum, but are also beneficial to tackle the stress and anxiety that comes from email overload:

- Only subscribe to news services that you want
- Unsubscribe from mailing lists that are no longer relevant to you
- Ensure the mailing lists you use are up to date
- Write concisely and keep messages as brief as possible
- Only message those who need the information; don't copy people in simply to cover your own back

These simple and easy tactics could be good for you, as well as for the planet, and are things you can do right now from wherever you may be sitting reading this.

Report from Ribble Valley Climate Action Network meeting in January.

Two of us attended which was part social with excellent refreshments, part 'getting to know' other attendees (roughly 25 - 30 came, including some local parish councillors), and part discussion about the 3-year plan for RVCAN. Both of our

Green Party borough councillors, Malcolm Peplow and Gaye McCrum attended. The event leaders gave a quick presentation, making it clear that 2023 had been a good year, with much achieved, but it was important to develop the organisation. The 3 year plan has 3 main objectives: to continue to support the Climate and Emergency bill and its fundamental principles; to focus on priorities from the 2023 Ribble Valley Climate and Nature Summit; and to develop RVCAN as an effective network and engage actively with all sections of the community. The main priority of the plan, in light of the climate and nature emergencies, is to empower and support the people of the Ribble Valley (all citizens and leaders) to make positive changes; so that by working together, the Ribble Valley achieves net zero and significantly reverses the decline in nature by 2030. Following a time of discussion in small groups we were encouraged to choose one of the proposed working parties to be set up. These included working parties to develop and improve local transport; to establish regenerative farming and food; a young people's group; an RVCAN active democracy working group; and a landscape and wildlife working group. We both Penny Galpin. February 2024. signed up for the latter.
